Mission

It is the mission of the David H. Ponitz Career Technology Center to challenge all students to achieve their maximum potential by exposing them to high quality instruction and real world educational experiences; we expect the highest performance as we empower students to be successful in the 21st century.

Vision and Philosophy

The David H. Ponitz Career Technology Center is a comprehensive career-technical high school. Our focus is academic achievement and career-technical training. Ponitz is an educational environment that integrates core academics with real-world experience.

Students are expected to develop skills to: communicate effectively, problem-solve, apply technology, manage resources, plan and manage a career.

Students have the opportunity to explore academic and career-technical options, participate in dual enrollment college coursework, earn college credit, obtain certifications in related career-technology areas, and work in related fields.

ADULT STUDENTS

Adult students are students who are 18 years of age or older. The school reserves the right to contact parents of adult students regarding attendance and academic progress. Students of all ages will adhere to the policy and guidelines stated for early dismissals, absences, conduct, and tardies. Adult students must have documentation (doctor's note, court document, etc.) to verify the need to sign out without parent permission.

BUS POLICY

- **Grades 9-12:** There is no transportation provided for general education students. Students who drive will be permitted to park in the lot. There is a \$10 fee to obtain a student parking permit.
- **RTA** is a public company. Students riding the RTA are expected to follow the rules, regulations and guidelines of the RTA. Students who do not abide by the RTA guidelines may be removed from the bus.

FEES & OBLIGATIONS

Fees are charged for laboratory classes and will be identified in the course syllabus. Students who are issued textbooks, uniforms, equipment, instruments, library books, etc. are responsible for returning or paying for any losses. Seniors who have outstanding obligations will not be permitted to participate in graduation activities, pick up caps, gowns, and graduation tickets until they are in good financial standing.

LOCKERS

Lockers are the property of the Dayton Board of Education. Students are not permitted to share lockers or move lockers once they have been assigned.

Students are not to deface the inside or outside of the locker with markers, liquid paper, stickers, tape, glue, paint, etc. If the locker is defaced, the student will be financially responsible for the damages.

LOST AND FOUND

Attempts will be made to return lost items marked with the student's name directly to the student. Items left in lockers at the end of the school year will be held for one week and then donated to charity.

LUNCH

Ponitz has a closed lunch. Students are required to remain in the school building during the lunch period. All students will remain in the cafeteria. Parents and guardians are **not permitted** to bring outside food in for their student before, during or after the lunch period.

MEDICATIONS

MEDICAL/HEALTH CONCERNS

Students should **rarely** miss school. In the case of a chronic health condition, please contact the school nurse. The nurse is able to provide help and resources so that you can attend school regularly. No student will be sent home with an illness until a parent/guardian or other designated adult has been contacted. With parent permission, only 11th and 12th grade students who have a minor illness may sign out and leave the building to go home. This is a Dayton Public Schools Board policy.

The Ohio Department of Health determines the immunizations required for school attendance. The school nurse will notify your parent or guardian if you do not meet the requirements. Parents are responsible for providing written documentation promptly whenever shots are given. Failure to provide proper written documentation will result in you being excluded from attending school.

Unless a routine medication is time-specific (during school hours) it should be given at home. All medications to be administered at school must be accompanied by the Medication Authorization form (primary healthcare provider order) and signed by the parent/guardian. This includes over the counter medication as well. We do encourage students with asthma to have rescue inhalers and spacers for use at school. Responsible students who are self-carrying their inhalers or epinephrine auto-injector must have physician approval. Forms can be found on the DPS website under Health Services or from the school nurse. New forms are needed each year.

Health screening is done by the school nurse for students in ninth, eleventh grade, and those new to DPS. This may include vision, hearing, and dental. If you are not to participate in the health screenings, your parent/guardian must send a written note to the school nurse. Parent(s)/Guardian(s) will be informed in writing if you need a medical evaluation for a possible problem.

Can we reach your parent/guardian by telephone in case of an emergency?

Please be sure the school (office, teacher and nurse) always has correct phone numbers and contact names.

Students are not permitted to have any prescription or over the counter medication in their possession. All prescription medicine must be kept in the clinic. In order for the nurse to administer medications, a form must be completed by the doctor who prescribed the medication. The nurse will not provide aspirin, Tylenol, cough syrup, etc. to students. If the paperwork is on file, asthmatic students may carry an inhaler with them. The nurse can be contacted @ **542-7236**.

MAKE-UP WORK

According to Dayton Public Schools Board Policy, students who have excused absences have the **number of days absent plus one** to turn in make-up work. Students who miss school or classes due to field trips, performances, or excused appointments should obtain assignments from their teachers in advance or upon their return. Make-up work **will** be accepted by teachers during a suspension.

PARKING

Students who drive to school may park on school property only with a student parking pass. Parking passes are \$10 and require proof of insurance and are only issued to students with a valid driver license. Students may park on any public street where permitted. Students who park on public streets do so at their own risk.

VISITORS

The parent of students interested in attending Ponitz should make arrangements with the principal. Parents are welcome to visit at any time. **Students are not permitted to bring relatives and friends to the school to spend the day.** Family members, friends, and guests are always welcome at performances, athletic events, and Open House. Students are not to bring babies/children to Ponitz during school hours.

GRADE CALCULATIONS _____

• **Grades 9 – 12:** Grades are calculated each quarter and credit is awarded each semester. Each quarter grade/percentage is weighted 40 percent, the semester exam is weighted 20 percent, and all are averaged to obtain a final semester grade.

Example: Qtr. 1(80%) Qtr. 2 (95%) Semester Exam (85%)

Calculation: $80 + 80 + 95 + 95 + 85 = 435$

$435 / 5 = 87\%$ **Semester Avg. = B**

GRADUATION CEREMONY _____

Participation in the graduation ceremony is a **privilege**. Students who have met all requirements for graduation and are in good financial standing may participate in commencement. Seniors are given a packet that outlines all expectations, rehearsal dates and times, and dress requirements. Students who do not adhere to the expectations will not participate in the graduation ceremony and will receive their diplomas at a later date.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS _____

Students in the class of 2017 must earn 20 cumulative credits in the categories below, pass all five parts of the Ohio Graduation Test (OGT), complete a state required Career Passport, and meet all financial obligations.

Students in the class of 2018 and beyond will not take the OGT. They must earn at least 18 points on state end of course exams, earn a remediation free score on a national admission test, or earn an industry-recognized credential and achieve a workforce-readiness score on a related job skills assessment. In addition, they must meet other requirements listed below.

SAT, PSAT, AND ACT_____

- A college bound student should take the SAT, ACT or both by the end of the junior year. Students should plan to take each test more than once. Fee waivers are available in the counseling office for students who have free or reduced lunch. Registration materials may be obtained in the guidance office or you may register for the SAT online @ www.collegeboard.com or register for the ACT online @ www.act.org.
- **SAT:** The SAT costs \$54.50 and is administered six times during the school year. The registration late fee is \$28; the standby fee is \$46.00 – both in addition to the test fee. A perfect SAT score is 1600 for math and critical reasoning, an average score is 1000. Additional scores are reported for the essay and multiple choice writing questions. Tests are anticipated to be administered on Oct. 1, Nov. 5, Dec. 3, 2016; Jan. 21, March 11, May 6, and June 4, 2017.
- **ACT:** The ACT costs \$39.50 and is administered six times per year. A perfect ACT score is 36, an average score is 21. The ACT plus Writing costs \$56.50. The late fee is \$23.00; the standby fee is \$45.00 in addition to the cost of the test. The test is administered on Sept. 10, Oct. 22, Dec. 10, 2016; Feb. 11, April 8, and June 10, 2017.
- **PSAT:** The PSAT is a good indicator of performance on the SAT and can be taken by students of any age. It is also the beginning of the National Merit Scholar competition and must be taken during the junior year to begin the two-year selection process. The cost is \$14.00 and will be administered on Wednesday, October 14, at Ponitz during the school day.

Schedule Changes_____

Students have **ten days** at the beginning of semester one and **five days** at the beginning of semester two to request a schedule change. The student must give a note to the counselor that explains the reason for the change and must be signed by a parent. The following reasons will be considered for schedule changes:

- Errors (student taking Language Arts 12 instead of 11)
- Courses needed for graduation
- Release period for work or college (juniors and seniors only)
- Change from honors to regular section of a course

ATTENDANCE PROCEDURES__

▪ Attendance Policy

Regular school attendance is required by Ohio Law. Ohio Revised Code 3321.19 states that the parent/guardian of children ages 6 – 18 must ensure that they attend school regularly. Excellent school attendance is directly related to each student's academic success.

1. The only excused reasons for absences are those recommended by the State of Ohio.
2. Students with 5 cumulative days of absence or 7 days of absence per month will be referred to Student Services as “habitual truant” or “chronic truant” in accordance with House Bill 181.

▪ **Late Arrivals/Tardy to School**

Class begins at 8:00 AM. Students wishing to have breakfast should arrive in a timely manner as to not be late for their first period class. Any student reporting late for first period must obtain a tardy pass from the Attendance Office. The only reasons for an excused tardy are the same as those indicated below for an excused absence.

Students arriving after 11:00 AM must present a doctor's note or be signed in by a parent or guardian.

▪ **Reporting an Early Dismissal**

Early dismissals will be honored only for the excused absence reasons or by permission of an administrator.

- a) **Parents/guardians should send a note to school on the day of the requested dismissal. Notes should include a day phone number of a parent/guardian. Students should give the note to the attendance office in the morning.**
- b) All requests will be verified by phone.
- c) After verification, the student will be released at the time of the dismissal.
- d) If a reason arises for an early dismissal and a note was not sent, the parent/guardian must come into the building to sign out the student.
Parents/guardians must present a valid ID for a student to be released.

College visits (up to four days). Verification of a college visit is required.

Functions, activities, or trips that enhance intellectual, spiritual, or emotional growth of the student; Permission from an administrator is required. Family vacations during instructional days are discouraged.

*There are unexcused absences about which a parent or guardian may know, but which are **not acknowledged** by the school as being legitimate reasons for being absent from school.*

▪ **Vacations**

Vacations are **discouraged** during school days. Parents must provide a written statement to the principal two weeks prior to their departure. Students may make up work upon their return from vacation. Work may not be provided in advance. Vacations taken during semester or final exams are unexcused and zeros will be given for exams not taken. There may be activities (science labs, group projects, speeches, etc.) that cannot be made up.

DISMISSAL FROM SCHOOL_____

At the end of the school day students are expected to exit the building unless under the direct supervision of a teacher or coach. Students are not to hang around the school waiting for rides. Transportation arrangements should be made so that all students are picked up within 30 minutes of dismissal time. Athletes should report to the gym or area designated by the coach. No students are to remain in the building or classrooms unsupervised.

ATHLETIC ELIGIBILITY_____

- **Grades 9-12:** To be eligible, a student must receive passing grades in a minimum of five one credit courses, or the equivalent, in the immediately preceding grading period. Students 19 years of age prior to August 1, 2016, may not participate in high school sports.

All students in grades 9-12 must submit a completed student participation form and pass a physical examination before they may practice for a school sport. Physical examinations are valid for one calendar year. All athletes must be in school the day of a game or the day before a game if school is not in session. For example, students must be in school on Friday, to participate on Saturday.

- **Student Athlete Conduct Policy (from OHSAA guidelines)**

Prospective athletes are expected to accept the responsibility and privilege of representing the school while participating in interscholastic athletics. Student athletes are to conduct themselves as role models in a position of leadership. Ponitz expects student athletes to treat opponents with respect; respect the judgment of contest officials; abide by contest rules; display no behavior that could incite fans or other participants in the contest or which is intended to embarrass, ridicule or demean others under any circumstances including on the basis of race, religion, gender or national origin; cooperate with officials, coaches and other participants.

DRESS CODE_____

Ponitz strives to foster an environment that is conducive to learning. We believe that proper attire positively contributes to a healthy climate and fosters proper demeanor. Students may not wear any apparel that is not approved Ponitz attire during the school day. Students in grades 10-12 wear approved uniforms based upon their career pathways. The freshman uniform is burgundy polo or dress shirt and khaki pants or knee length skirts.

Students are expected to wear attire that is appropriately sized to fit. Pants are to be worn at the waist with a belt.

Out of uniform days may be approved by the school administration. Students are not permitted to wear torn or ripped jeans, leggings, shorts, skirts or dresses above mid-high or open toe shoes. Open toe shoes present a safety hazard in pathway courses.

FRIDAY SCHOOL_____

Students may be assigned to Friday School for cutting class, or other disciplinary reasons as determined by an administrator. Students who do not show up for an assigned Friday School may be suspended from school.

EXTENDED SCHOOL DAY_____

Students may be assigned to a three (3) hour detention for disciplinary reasons as determined by an administrator. Students who do not show up for an assigned extended day may be suspended for a period of up to three (3) days.

ELECTRONIC DEVICES _____

- **iPods, MP3 players, cell phones for music or games, headphones of any type** are not to be used during the school day. These items may only be used before and after school. **They are not to be used during breakfast, lunch, or in the halls between classes.**
- **All telecommunication devices are to be turned off upon entering the building and placed immediately in the student's locker.**

BEHAVIOR CONSEQUENCES _____

The school climate must be orderly, safe, and conducive to learning. Students who disrupt the learning process are violating the rights of those who want to learn. Listed below are consequences for violations of DPS and school rules. Efforts are always made to contact parents either by phone, mail, or email. ***The administration reserves the right to modify the consequences, in accordance with due process and board policy, based on the circumstances or severity of an incident.***

Arson (*setting fire or attempting to set fire to any school property*) (Level 3)

1st Offense – immediate removal from school, suspension, recommendation for expulsion, possible police report

Assault, Aggravated Assault, Battery, Aggravated Battery (Level 3)

1st offense – immediate removal from school, suspension, recommendation for expulsion, possible police report

Bomb Threats/False Alarms (*pulling a fire alarm*) (Level 3)

1st offense – immediate removal from school, suspension, recommendation for expulsion and police report filed

Bullying /Cyber-bullying/Harassment/Hazing/Intimidation – Bullying, harassment and intimidation are intentional written, verbal or physical acts that a student has exhibited toward another particular student more than once causing either mental or physical harm to the other student and is sufficiently severe, persistent or pervasive that it creates an intimidating, threatening or abusive educational environment for the other student. This includes activities engaged in via computer and/or electronic communications devices. (Level 3)

1st offense – immediate removal from school, suspension, possible recommendation for expulsion, possible police report

Cutting Classes (Level 2 – leaving school/class without permission)

1st offense – Detention with teacher + parent contact

2nd offense – Friday School + parent contact + intent to suspend

Dress Code – including out of Uniform (Level 1)

1st offense – Friday School + Intent to Suspend

2nd offense – 1 day suspension

Drug/Alcohol use or possession/ Paraphernalia use or possession/Selling Drugs (Level 3)

1st offense – 10-day suspension, drug education/treatment program and behavior contract

2nd offense – 10-day suspension, violation of contract, recommendation for expulsion

Extortion (bribery, solicitation of money or valuables) (Level 2)

1st offense – Extended Day School, intent to suspend (mandatory parent conference)

2nd offense – suspension, possible recommendation for expulsion

Fighting or Inciting a Fight, Contributing to a disruptive situation (circumstances will impact consequences) (Level 2)

1st offense – immediate removal from school, possible suspension

2nd offense – 10 day suspension, behavior contract

3 or more – 10 day suspension, violation of contract, recommendation for expulsion

Forgery/Falsification/Plagiarism (Level 2)

1st offense – Friday School, intent to suspend (mandatory parent conference)

2nd offense – suspension (3 – 10 days)

Gang Related Graffiti, Gestures, or Activity (Level 2)

1st Offense – immediate removal from school, suspension, recommendation for expulsion, possible police report

Harassment of Another Student (Level 2)

1st offense Friday School, intent to suspend (mandatory parent conference)

2nd offense – 3 day suspension

3 or more – suspension/recommendation for expulsion

Headphones – may be used before and after school; they are not to be seen during breakfast, lunch, or in the hallways

1st offense – Confiscation, Friday School

2nd offense – Confiscation, parent contact and pick up, intent to suspend

3rd offense – suspension

Leaving School Grounds without Permission (Level 2)

1st offense - Friday School, intent to suspend

2nd offense – 3 day suspension

3rd offense – 5 day suspension

Possession of cigarettes, lighters, matches (Level 3)

1st offense – Friday School, confiscation & parent contact

2nd offense – confiscation & 1 day suspension from school

3rd offense – confiscation & 3 day suspension from school

4 or more – suspension/possible recommendation for expulsion

Profanity Use (Level 2)

1st offense – Friday School, Intent to Suspend

2nd offense – 1 day suspension

3rd offense – 3 day suspension from school

Profanity directed at a Staff Member (Verbal Abuse of Staff - Level 2)

1st offense – 3 day removal from school

2nd offense – Up to 10 day suspension with possible recommendation for expulsion

Refusal to Serve a Teacher Assigned Detention (Level 2)

1st offense – administrator will direct student to serve detention with teacher

2nd offense – Friday Day School

3rd offense - 3 day suspension from school + behavior contract

4 or more – Up to 10 day suspension with possible recommendation for expulsion

Refusal to Serve Friday School (Level 2)

1st offense – 1 day suspension

2nd offense – 3 day suspension from school

Repeated Violations/Incorrigible Conduct (an accumulation of other offenses) (Level 2)

1st offense – Friday School, intent to suspend (mandatory parent conference)

2nd offense – 3 day suspension

3rd offense – 5 day suspension

4th or more – 10 day suspension, possible recommendation for expulsion

Roughhousing/playing (includes running in halls, sitting on window sills, standing on furniture, standing on chairs, play fighting, wrestling) (Level 2)

1st offense – warning and/or community service, parent notification

2nd offense – Friday School & parent notification

3rd offense – Friday School, Intent to suspend & parent notification

4 or more – suspension + behavior contract

Sexual Misconduct/Sexual Offenses (any willful or deliberate act committed on school property – including buses – with the intention of gaining sexual favors or furthering acts lewd or lascivious in nature) (Level 3)

1st Offense – immediate removal from school, 10 day suspension, possible recommendation for expulsion, possible police report

Smoking on School Grounds (in or out of the building) (Level 3)

1st offense – 3 day suspension

2nd offense – 5 day suspension

3 or more – possible recommendation for expulsion

Theft/Possession of Stolen Property (Level 3)

1st offense – intent to suspend, probable suspension, possible police report, probable recommendation for expulsion

Threatening a Student (*administration reserves the right to modify consequences based on circumstances or severity of threat*) (Level 2)

1st offense – Friday School, Intent to suspend (mandatory parent conference)

2nd offense – 3 day suspension from school

3 or more – suspension/possible recommendation for expulsion

Threatening a Staff Member (Level 2)

1st offense – immediate removal from school, suspension, and probable recommendation for expulsion/police report

Vandalism (*defacing school property, bathroom walls, student artwork, furniture, lockers, etc.*)

1st offense – student removes vandalism, fined for damages, removed from school, possible recommendation for expulsion/police report

Weapons/Incendiary Devices/Fireworks (Level 3)

Weapons include, but are not limited to, a firearm, club, chain, knife, taser, razor, look-alike or replica object that can be considered a weapon or used as a weapon. This includes bringing such items into the school or to a school-sponsored activity for another person. It also includes having items in a locker, desk, a school bus, or on school property.
